A dog owner writes

Spring is here, birds are nesting and lambs are skipping round the fields. We are lucky in the Yealands to have many lovely places to walk our dogs. But, dog owners, are you aware of the laws with regard to letting your dog off lead at this time of year? Dogs should be kept on a short lead between 1 March and 31 July in open country and common land and at all times near farm animals. By law, farmers are entitled to destroy a dog that injures or worries their animals. Also farm animals can become aggressive if their young are approached. If this happens it is safer for you to drop the lead and retreat rather than trying to protect your dog and risk being injured.

Dog mess is unpleasant and can give other animals and people, especially children, nasty infections. So please always clean up after your dog and put the plastic poo bag in the bin. There are bins at regular intervals in our villages so you will not have far to carry it. Worming your dog regularly will help to keep it healthy and tick prevention is very important. We live in an area where ticks are a problem and dogs can get Lyme's disease just like humans. Given the mild wet winter we have had it is likely there will be more ticks than ever this spring.
